What do we mean by 'hidden history'?

This is the story of men and women resisting the established order in the struggle for their rights to be respected and established.

Being treated equally, regardless of status or identity, and the right to vote for all men and women regardless of wealth or property, were not always rights we possessed. People had to struggle for the right to the right to join with others to demand a living wage, and the right to public health, and a clean environment.

Further back, we celebrate the forgotten voices – for example the story of the Diggers, trying to establish their rights to common land, the Levellers who fought for a widening of the franchise, religious tolerance and equality before the law.

We celebrate the struggles of those who were ignored or ridiculed at the time, such as the suffragettes, the trade unions, the conscientious objectors, and campaigners who fought for those in slavery.
